	We have a career/volunteer work Hall of Fame of people in our community and greater Halifax. We had:
	<ul> <li>Tia Upshaw- the CEO of Black Women in Excellence ( upper elementary) She started her own cleaning business and sold it for an excellent profit, now she has many other businesses and helps young people starting out in business to get set up.</li> <li>Twila Grosse- Honourable Twila Grosse was first African Nova Scotian and woman elected to the Nova Scotia House of Assembly as MLA for Preston.</li> <li>Shade Akintola- Nurse and trained as a lawyer, talked about her work as a nurse, her career history, her family and her life in Nigeria.</li> <li>Kehinde Akintola- talked about his job as a Sheriff working for the department of Justice, his training as a lawyer, his family and his connection to the theme for this month. (Our smiles, our joy, our resilience)</li> <li>Owen Lee- Local professional musician, talked about his work with the Masstown choir, the process of writing and producing music,</li> </ul>

- playing keyboards with Classified and his passion as a performer. He is the proud father of 5.
- Anthony Brown- talked about his career in corrections, his life in Jamaica, Quebec. His passion for sports football, and basketball. He shared awards, a football helmet, medals, family photos from Jamaica. He talked about his passion working in the community and giving back, he coaches the junior NBA for the Cole Harbour Rockets. Two of our students play for him and were proud to get their picture taken with him.

SSP- focus on students of African Canadian and Indigenous descent to improve in all areas, Math, Literacy, and Well Being

Math

We currently have a Math coach Dwayne Slobodnick in to work with grade 2 teachers on differentiating instruction. He will be working with upper elementary teachers next week and will coach the new 4-5 and 5-6 Math teacher who will be starting soon. He guided us to another helpful document to simplify the concepts students should have in fact fluency and will be sharing it with staff as it is more user friendly for formative assessment.

## Literacy

We worked with Lit. Coach Jennifer Peck in the grade 2 classes with a focus on Guided reading. Also, Jenn discovered ways to help teachers further

We are pivoting our intervention model where resource is going to be doing more intensive daily intervention for a cycle, until the end of March.

She is also moving into a co-teaching model in two classrooms. Where the instruction and planning is done together for a more cohesive model of intervention.

## Social Emotional

- We did a well-being survey. Grades 3-6 students completed it. We looked at the summary data at our last staff meeting.
- Stand outs- all but a couple of students said they had at least one adult that they could talk to.
- Students felt the safest in the classroom.

	<ul> <li>Many students said unkind words is the thing that is the most troubling thing for them.</li> <li>Big actions- classroom conversations about what it means to be rude or mean.</li> <li>Work with individual students who identified themselves as not having an adult in the building they could go to.</li> </ul>
